Across the nation, local historical societies have been asked to spotlight what happened *in their area*.

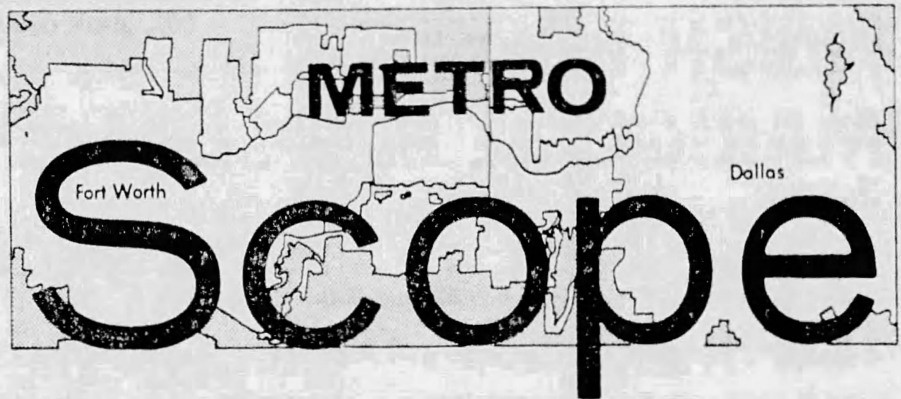

On July 4, 1976, during our country's 100th anniversary, Bicentennial Park was dedicated. The park was the city's first—and for a long time only—park.

Southlake to dedicate first city park July 4

The Bicentennial Park of Southlake, the first park in the 2,500-population city on the southwest shore of Lake Grapevine, will be dedicated in ceremonies July 4.

The 8.2-acre park, at White Chapel Road north of Southlake Boulevard, eventually will have two lighted baseball diamonds, a community center, swimming pool, playground area, picnic area and three tennis courts.

The park was designed by Carter & Burgess Inc. of Fort Worth. The Tarrant County Mayors' Advisory Council has allocated federal community development funds for two of the tennis courts and the city has applied for U. S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation funds for further park development.
