What's Going On

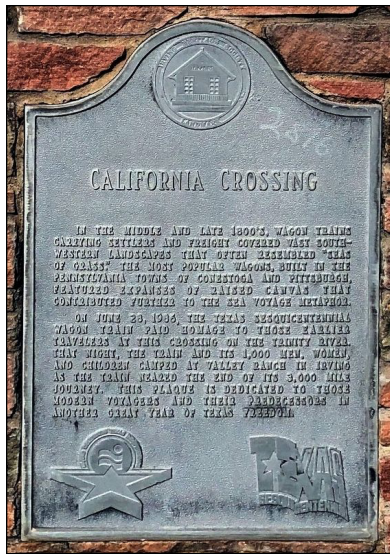

Did You Know?

The City of Southlake's log house (Bicentennial Park) sits next to Bunker Hill, which settlers used as a lookout point, and Blossom Prairie, a campground that pioneers reached after a hard day's trip from the California Crossing of the Trinity River, near what's now the Irving-Dallas city limits. After the travelers rested, the wagons would again line up single file and head west, for awhile traveling somewhat along a route that would later become Texas Hwy. 114.



In 1986, the Irving Historical Society installed this marker (left) at Rochelle and California Crossing roads. And in 2012, the Texas Historical Commission dedicated this marker (right) at California Crossing Road and Riverside Drive in Irving.



Adjacent the log house, in the Blossom Prairie Wildflower Area, is the Prairie Winds sculpture that represents those early settlers and the wagon trains that were part of that westward migration. The sculpture was installed in 2020 as part of the City of Southlake's Public Art Collection.
